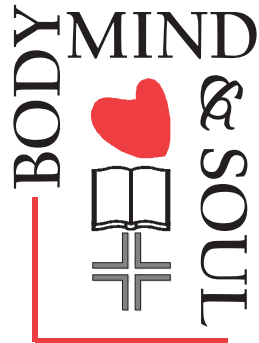

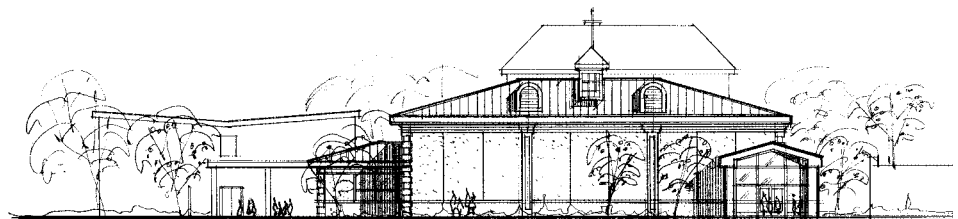

Judith Ammerman, educator and lifelong champion of educational causes, dedicates her time and energy to helping children succeed. A former mathematics teacher, Ms. Ammerman spent the first six of her 34 teaching years at Roosevelt Junior/Senior High School and the remaining 28 years at Garden City Middle School, where she served as the Mathematics Department Chairperson for the last seven of those years. Now retired from teaching, she continues to be active in the field of education.

A native Long Islander, Judith is very involved with many regional agencies focused on education and the well being of families. She was the first to sponsor the Institute for Student Achievement's COMET program for a seventh grade class at the Alverta B. Gray Schultz Middle School in Hempstead. She serves on the Board of Trustees of the Family and Children's Association, actively supports the Nassau County Coalition against Domestic Violence, the Interfaith Nutrition Network, the Mill Neck Foundation for Deaf Ministry, and many other social service agencies on Long Island.

As Co-President of the Garden City Branch of the American Association of University Women, Ms. Ammerman is helping to promote equity for all women and girls, education and self-development over the life span, and positive societal change.

Judith is a life-long member of the Lutheran Church of Our Saviour, Mineola where she currently serves as the Mission Secretary, the Chairperson of the Education Committee, and is a member of the choir. For the past two summers she has been the site coordinator for the one-week New Ground Day Camp at Our Saviour. She is a trustee of the Lutheran Counseling Center and Long Island Lutheran Middle & High School. As an administrative officer of The Episcopal, Lutheran, Presbyterian Committee for Shared Ministry in Mineola, she was instrumental in connecting LuHi students with the Mineola Food Outreach Center.

Among the honors Judith has received for her work are the Seeds of Hope Award from Wheat Ridge Ministries and induction into the Children's House Beacon of Hope Society. She was the Education Honoree for The Institute for Student Achievement and was most recently given the Silent Samaritan Recognition Award by the Lutheran Counseling Center and the Lutheran Service Award for Volunteer Service by United Lutheran Appeal. The Metropolitan New York Synod of the ELCA bestowed the Distinguished Disciple Award on her in 2000.

Ms Ammerman earned a bachelor's degree at Connecticut College, where she is currently serving a second five-year term as a member of the Board of Trustees. Most recently, she was honored by her Alma Mater in a dedication ceremony of the Ammerman Center for Arts and Technology. Her two master's degrees were earned at Adelphi University. Judith, a longtime friend of LuHi, helped establish the Middle School by supporting the addition of the sixth grade. She is committed to helping meet the challenge of offering a Christian education to young people through her support and encouragement.

Pro Deo et Schola, meaning "For God and School," is the highest honor given at Long Island Lutheran. It is presented annually to a senior boy and girl as well as an adult member of the LuHi Family in honor of their positive influence and outstanding contribution to the life of the school.

Ed Lowe

Former Educator and Newsday Columnist presents “Everything Counts”



Once a junior high school English teacher, Ed Lowe joined *Newsday* as a reporter in 1969. He became a featured columnist in 1976. He writes stories and essays three times a week for *Newsday* and until recently hosted a daily radio talk show, “Lowecally Speaking with Ed Lowe.” In each of its three years on the air, the program won a FOLIO award from the Long Island Coalition for Fair Broadcasting. For his work in *Newsday*, The Press Club of Long Island honored Ed Lowe as “Journalist of the Year – 2000.”

In September 2003, Ed Lowe began his 13th season as a regular panelist on “Father Tom and Friends,” a weekly cablevision show produced by Msgr. Tom Hartman of Telecare. Ed has performed at four leading Long Island Comedy Clubs and has served as a Master of Ceremonies for scores of charity gatherings and galas. He has keynoted staff conference days for 70 school districts, three BOCES supervisory districts and six statewide conventions of educators and education administrators.

Co-Author with New York psychotherapist Stanley Siegel of “The Patient Who Cured His Therapist” and “Uncharted Lives,” both published by Dutton/Plume, Ed Lowe has edited two published collections of his own work: “Ed Lowe’s Long Island,” and “Not As I Do – A Father’s Report.”

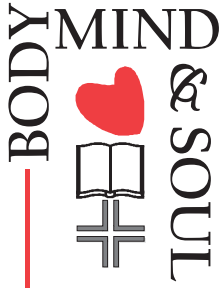

PHASE I

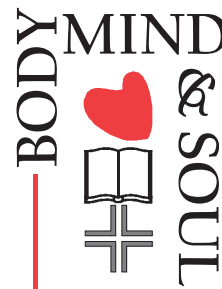

EMERGING NEEDS

As with every endeavor at LuHi, we want to complete goals responsibly. Emerging needs over the last few years encouraged leaders to re-evaluate, specifically, Goal #2 - the Physical Education Center. As a result, plans were made to redesign the original building and create a space to accommodate the important growing needs in a new Physical Education/Fine Arts Center.

PHASE II

Building upon Phase I of the **BODY, MIND & SOUL** Campaign, Phase II will continue to seek funding for a variety of programs. The redesigned Physical Education/Fine Arts Center is a highlight of Phase II. The goals of Phase II also address a variety of other needs over the next four years. The completion of all goals will best accommodate Long Island Lutheran's student body and its educational programs.

GOAL #1:

ACADEMIC, EXTRA-CURRICULAR & SERVICE PROGRAMS \$300,000

- Teach students "to be like Christ" through Christian Service opportunities.
- Maintain a life-cycle plan for campus technology.
- Support faculty in curricular innovation and creativity, enhancing and expanding our academic, athletic, and co-curricular programs.

GOAL #2:

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS \$2,200,000

- Construct a Physical Education/Fine Arts Center to provide additional space for physical education and athletics, as well as rehearsal space for music, drama, and dance.
- Make improvements to areas of LuHi's learning environment, including classrooms, common spaces, and school grounds.

GOAL #3:

THE ENDOWMENT AND SCHOLARSHIPS \$500,000

- Build the Memorial Endowment Fund via cash, planned, and estate gifts.
- Increase assistance to students through Named Endowed Scholarships.

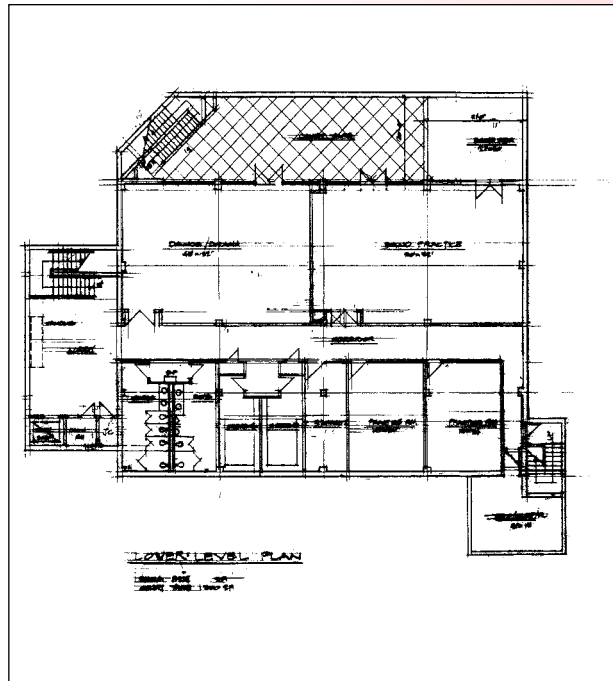
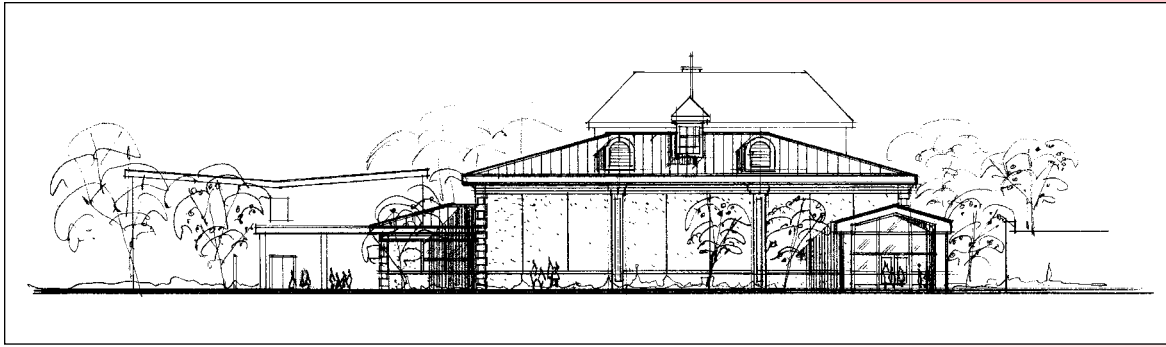
Capital Improvements



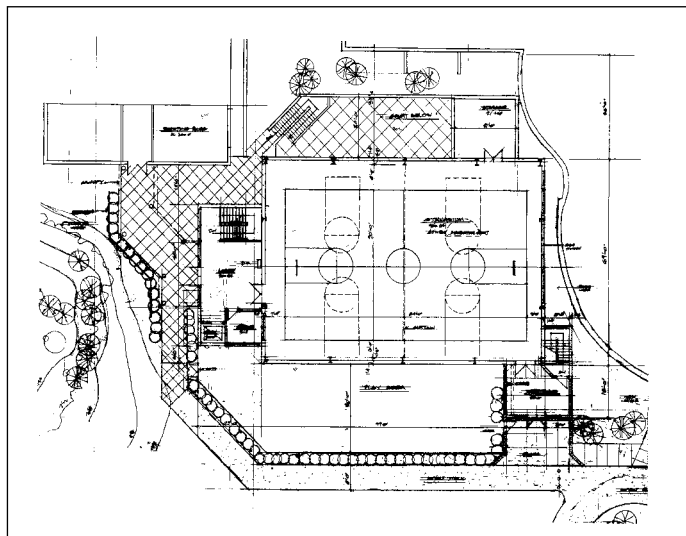
